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






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BACK TO SCHOOL

NBRPA BRINGS THE INAUGURAL LEGENDS OF BASKETBALL SHOWCASE TO CHICAGO

efore most of the National Basketball Retired Players Association's (NBRPA) members were considered NBA and WNBA Legends, they were gracing the campuses of various universities and colleges around the country.

Before showcasing their skills in cities like New York, Seattle and Los Angeles, they were astonishing the nation in places such as Chapel Hill, Ann Arbor and Madison.

With college basketball being such a large part of our members' hoops careers, it's no wonder the NBRPA has decided to tap into its collegiate roots and present the inaugural Legends of Basketball Showcase at the United Center in Chicago this coming December.

The college basketball quadruple-header will not only showcase the

game's future stars but will also spotlight the work of the NBRPA over the years. The National Basketball Retired Players Association has always honored the legacy of its members, so it's only natural to highlight the places where so many members began their basketball journey. In what promises to be an exciting day of men's college hoops, the four-game set will feature Northern Iowa facing Towson, Tulane taking on George Mason, Dayton matching up against Wyoming and NC State battling Vanderbilt.

The eight programs competing in the Legends of Basketball Showcase are no strangers to success and have collectively produced over 200 NBA Draft selections. The schools also have deep ties to NBRPA membership. At the helm of Vanderbilt is 18-year NBA veteran Jerry Stackhouse, the

former No. 3 overall draft pick and two-time All-Star who appeared in 970 games for eight teams. Wyoming assistant coach Shaun Vandiver is a former first-round pick (25th overall) by the Golden State Warriors in the 1991 NBA Draft. George Mason head coach Kim English was drafted in the second round of the 2012 NBA Draft (44th overall) by the Detroit Pistons, and Northern Iowa assistant coach Seth Tuttle played for the Miami Heat's Summer League team in 2015.

It's not just membership that has ties to these schools. Our Board Chairman, Johnny Davis, is a Dayton alum who led the Flyers in scoring for three consecutive seasons (1973-76) before spending nearly four decades with the NBA as a player, front office executive, assistant and head coach. NBRPA Board Members Thurl Bailey and Chucky Brown are NC State alums. Bailey led the Wolfpack in scoring and rebounding during the team's miracle 1983 NCAA Championship season before embarking on a 13-season NBA career, and Brown led NC State in scoring in 1988 (16.6 ppg) and rebounding during the 1989 season (8.8 rpg).

NBRPA President & CEO Scott Rochelle spoke to us about the thrill of being able to bring this event to life.

"We are thrilled to partner with Intersport to present the Legends of Basketball Showcase, especially here in our home base of Chicago," Rochelle said. "With its connection to our organization, this event is a natural fit for us to undertake, and we couldn't be more excited for our members and the programs involved."

"The Legends of Basketball Showcase is going to be an extraordinary day and night of top-notch men's college hoops entertainment, and we look forward to it being a marquee event on the NCAA basketball calendar for years to come."

Along with some incredible basketball being on display, the event will serve as a living testament to the work the NBRPA has done over three decades for its membership. The NBRPA's charitable efforts, scholarship programs and member initiatives will all be highlighted. We look forward to catching up with our extended family in person as we take in a full day of this game that has captivated us.

PROVIDING GUIDANCE AND A NETWORK FOR SUCCESS TO PLAYERS TRANSITIONING TO LIFE AFTER BASKETBALL

"Either you leave the game, or the game leaves you," Mario West says.____

For West, who played four seasons with the Nets and Hawks and another five in Europe, Asia and South America as a shooting guard, it was the latter. And it changed his life.

Like countless men and women who have played professional sports, West spent years focused on the relentless, glamor-free reality of turning an impossible dream into a steady career. His days were tightly regimented. He had a workout routine, a strict diet and a tight schedule.

The sacrifices constrained him, but they were necessary. But then West was granted crippling freedom: he tore his Achilles tendon.

Not only did the injury cause West to lose out on a more lucrative contract, but he also became undesirable to teams. Barely in his thirties, his career was done, but life went on.

"I could no longer do the things that made me - me," he says.

West couldn't hang out with the guys. It weighed on him mentally. What was next? He wasn't destitute, but there was no money coming in and too much going out.

To get back into the game, he took a job working as Director of Player Personnel for the men's basketball team at his alma mater, Georgia Tech. He oversaw the players' day-to-day needs and organized the team's community service activities. He wanted to coach but was passed over for that opportunity.

That's when West talked with Purvis Short, the Warriors great and longtime fixture of the National Basketball Players Association. Short advised West to look at the NBPA's programs. So, West did, participating in ones for leadership development and coaching. He wound up gaining a new purpose in life.

"I discovered that my passion is serving and helping others while being connected to the game itself," West says.

He is now the director of the NBPA's Off the Court program, which helps players transition to life after basketball. The program began in 2017 under former NBA All-Star Antonio Davis.

"It gives me the best of both worlds," says the 38-year-old. "It allows me the opportunity to assist players where I struggled most and to have direct impact and influence. What matters more is there's a bridge for players to make the journey into the unknown with confidence."

There is no uniform course of action for a basketball player's next chapter, West says. Some want to get a college degree or a certification through the NBPA's continued education reimbursement program. Some want to look at broadcasting. Older players, he says, frequently

need a resume or to learn LinkedIn to get a job. Others are still playing and want to plan ahead.

Off the Court alumni who have found success in another venture, such as Josh Childress in real estate, speak about their perspectives on life after basketball. Users can also "build their own experience" and see what a job at Amazon or Nike looks like.

"It's sitting one-on-one and meeting guys where they are," West says.

Everything is done in-house. To borrow a phrase from NBPA head Tamika Tremaglio, West calls Off the Court, the 411 and 911 for players. The five "pillars" of the program are mental health and wellness, physical wellness, financial literacy, career and the brotherhood.


"It's a holistic approach to serve the players that involve every aspect of the NBPA," says West, who struggled with all five of Off the Court's pillars. "Not everybody will struggle the same. Without basketball as a career, some former players suffer an identity crisis or grow bored. They could get out of shape."

West says the COVID-19 pandemic, which paused the NBA season in March 2020, raised awareness of a basketball-free future, and active players aren't sticking to sports — witness Draymond Green's podcast/ TNT appearances, LeBron James' school or Giannis Antetokounmpo's part-ownership of the Milwaukee Brewers.

When restrictions were lifted, West started to make his presence known. He's based in Atlanta, so there are at least 41 opportunities a year to approach players before or after a game, not to mention numerous events — pro-ams, Summer League — where players gather.

That includes holding health screenings for retired players with the National Retired Players Association. One was held during Summer League in Las Vegas.

In building relationships with current players, West doesn't press. He identifies himself and what he does. He'll offer to set up a player with a gym in Atlanta or a trainer. It's all about showing up, checking in and showing that he cares.

"What I've found is once you mention what you do, being a former player, maybe the first time they'll say, 'What's up? Nice to meet you,' West says. "After that second or third time, they'll come up to me with, 'Hey man, I was thinking about x, y and z."

In late September, West hosted a workshop for eight to 10 "transitioning" players in New York. They toured the NBPA office, met the staff and learned more about Off the Court's resources. A panel discussion was planned, along with a talk by Hall of Famer Isiah Thomas, one of West's mentors.

"You want to create that intimate, locker room feel to engender conversation," West explains.

There is life after basketball ends.

"When we played the game, you played for the award," he says. "The award is the trophy. You can play for that championship. Things have come full circle because I know what it felt like to struggle — the loss of identity, the loss of confidence. It's no different than playing in the game, and you are in a slump, then you have that old veteran reminding you of who you are and what you're capable of doing."

What's the trophy for West now?

"The reward for me is that I was able to be transparent and be vulnerable and share not only my intimate, personal story and how I got on my feet, but also provide a service," he says, referring to helping someone through the five pillars. "When you see that person after talking to them on the phone, and you get that dap and that bear hug, there's no greater feeling."

In fact, he says, it's a lot like when a shooting slump ends. You're on fire, the opposing team calls a time out, and your teammates leap off the bench to greet you.

The brotherhood is still there. This time, the arena is different.

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


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A LIFETIME IN BASKETBALL PREPARES JOE DUMARS FOR HIS NEW ROLE WITHIN NBA LEADERSHIP



he irony of being the NBA's Dean of Discipline is not lost on former Detroit Pistons Bad Boy Joe Dumars. Not so long ago, he received phone calls from the league office telling him who was in trouble and why, most infamously after the Malice at the Palace brawl in 2004.

"No question there is a touch of irony there," Dumars said in August. "I have been a member of teams and front offices that have had a lot of dealings with this office, but it helps me inform my perceptions of this job."


Dumars' new job (he began in May) is Executive Vice President, Head of Basketball Operations, also informally known as the league office's Bearer of Bad News. Dumars comes in after three years in the Sacramento Kings' front office. He made a coast-to-coast move and settled on the Upper West Side of Manhattan, easing his commute to the league offices on 51st and Fifth Avenue.

That's where he will review flagrants, technicals and worse before getting on the phone with team executives, usually to deliver bad news.

How Dumars goes about that job in the 2022-23 season will go a long way toward determining how he is viewed compared to his predecessors Rod Thorn, Stu Jackson and Kiki Vandeweghe.

He met with them over the summer to listen to their advice, and the one common denominator was this: Be a communicator, even when there is no bad news to communicate.

"I had dinner with all three of those guys, and what stuck with me was how they said I needed to get on the phone with all of the people I will be dealing with, and when there is bad news to deliver, call and explain," Dumars said. "You have to add a personal touch. You cannot just be a hammer and nothing else. You have relationships with these people."

Dumars is universally regarded as a nice guy, which his predecessors said he needs to use to his advantage.

"Joe has a great personality for that job. It requires neutrality, and he must be even-keeled because teams get highly emotional when dealing with that office," Vandeweghe said. "The best piece of advice I gave him was to stay in touch with everybody because you don't want to talk to these people only when there is a problem. You want relationships that are positive at times because people are going to be upset at you most of the time."

Like many former players, Dumars hears the complaints about how the game has changed in uncomfortable ways for many players from his generation. And while he does not necessarily disagree that the game has become softer and more 3-point-oriented, Dumars is quick to assert that each generation gets to choose the brand of basketball that will be played in the NBA, and today's players are playing a game that is a product of so much focus on outside shooting at the development level all the way through the pro ranks.

"You are a steward of the game when sitting in this seat, and part of the job is not letting the game get stale, being progressive," Dumars said. "We cannot allow the game to get stale and outdated."

Dumars spent much of his first three months of the new job onboarding into his office and his roles with different committees, including the Competition Committee, the General Managers' Committee and the Coaches' Committee. He came aboard during the NBA Finals and quickly had his hands involved in the Pre-Draft Camp, the Draft Lottery and Summer League, all while undergoing the arduous task of relocating, which every once-traded retired NBA player can relate to.

He steps into a role that seems at odds with his disposition, a well-liked former team executive who now must be the designated bad guy when situations call for it.

"Joe will be great in that job because he is respected by virtually everyone for what he was as a player, a cerebral good guy," Thorn said. "He has universal respect in the league, and coming in with that is a real plus for him. The best advice I gave him was to be himself. I told him you have a good feel for what goes on in the league and to be honest all the time. Treat everybody equally, do what you've done your whole life, and you'll be fine."

The Competition Committee rules change that everyone will see highlighted this year is the change of the penalty for a "take foul." The change will award the aggrieved team one free throw and a retained possession on instances where a foul was committed to stifle a fast break

while not meeting the criteria for a clear path foul. There were approximately 1,700 such instances last season, each of which stopped a fast break, slowed the game down and took a potential highlight off SportsCenter.

On Dumars' plate moving forward is finding a way to enhance team rivalries because, for every budding Grizzlies-Warriors dynamic, many fans remember the Lakers-Celtics and Bulls-Pistons battles. And what is best for the game is finding a way to not only please the younger fans who advertisers are catering to but also serve the older fans who often feel overlooked — especially when they tell their grandkids about the glory days.

It is not easy being the designated bad guy, which is what Dumars will have to be in his new role. But anyone who knows him knows that Dumars is the furthest thing ever from an actual bad guy, which is why the NBA's sportsmanship award is named after him.

"It's a tough job, dealing with so many entities: Players, coaches, GMs, referees and owners, and competition brings out the best in all of us," Jackson said. "I told him to remind himself that he knows more about the game of basketball than they do. I told him to keep that in mind."

He will have to find a way to include his personal touch on unpleasant matters that are

going to come across his desk, but you cannot help but believe that he was given this job in large part because everyone who has ever known him genuinely likes him. Whether that dynamic can continue remains to be seen, but there is no doubting that Dumars is about the most grounded person to sit in that seat in a long time. Not that Jackson, Thorn or Vandeweghe were bad guys, because they are most certainly not. But you could always find someone to bad mouth them, whereas the next guy to bad-mouth Dumars may be the first.

FULL COURT PRESS:

HALL OF FAME ENSHRINEMENT WEEKEND 2022



To close out the 2022 Hall of Fame Enshrinement Weekend, the NBRPA hosted the annual Full Court Press clinic at the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame on Sunday morning. 





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HARD WORK, PREPARATION, AND TRUST:

RICK CARLISLE SHARES REFLECTIONS AND ADVICE AS HE ENTERS YEAR 22 AS A HEAD COACH

ard work, preparation and trust are the mantras that have served Rick Carlisle well as a head coach and President of the National Basketball Coaches Association. With more than 30 years in the game, Carlisle offers insights for players looking to continue their careers on the hardwood.

When Nets head coach Bill Fitch pulled a then 30-year-old Carlisle into his New Jersey Nets office in 1989, he had news that no player wanted to hear.

"He called me up and basically told me that I was waived," Carlisle remembers more than 30 years later.

With those words, the Nets head coach closed that chapter of Carlisle's life. But with



his next sentence, Fitch turned the page to a new chapter.

"He told me if I was interested, he had an assistant coaching position," Carlisle recalled. "He thought I could be successful."

He was grateful when the opportunity presented itself, but this didn't make the news from Fitch any easier to swallow. It helped that through his five years in the NBA, the Ogdensburg, New York native understood as much as he loved playing, it wouldn't last forever.

"When I was playing, I was very aware that I was a role player and that every year I was fighting for a job on a roster," Carlisle remembers. "I think there was only one year, maybe two, that I had a guaranteed contract heading into the season. So, I was always very guarded and realistic about my future as a player."


Coaching always fascinated Carlisle, he even attended several coaching clinics in high school. Between his freshman year of high school and last year of college basketball, he'd had seven coaches in eight years of playing. He'd certainly experienced plenty of different coaching styles to pull from and help mold his own.

"I've played for many tremendous coaches," said Carlisle. "I was exposed to a lot of different approaches, different teaching styles, etc., and I just kind of absorbed all of it and stored it away."

His first assistant job with the Nets involved a lot of scouting, time Carlisle used to observe players and their coaches.

"I was scouting all the teams in the league," Carlisle remembers. "So, it was a master class, an opportunity to study everyone. If you are a musician learning how to play jazz, for example, it'd be the same as listening to other musicians and getting a feel for different styles and approaches."

Two of the 'musicians' he observed most closely





were the ones he was coaching for with the Nets in his early years as an assistant; Hall-of-Famers Bill Fitch and then Chuck Daly.

"It was an unbelievable beginning to my coaching career."

Carlisle's chance to play his own music came a few years later when he was named the head coach of the 2001 Detroit Pistons. After two years, he moved on to Indiana and, later, the Dallas Mavericks — where he became one of just 12 people to win an NBA Championship as a player and as a coach. Along the way, he discovered his own coaching style was heavily influenced by two key ingredients: experience and trust. "Having played in the league is an advantage," said Carlisle of his ability to connect with his players. "You've done it, you've competed on the floor, you've played for different coaches. In my experience, I was fortunate enough to play on a championship team in 1986, and those things helped. But when you get into the job, it's going to be less about what you've done in the past and way more about what your approach is. The things that really matter are the way you build relationships, your knowledge of the game and your ability to impart everything effectively to your players so they can have success."

As he built relationships, he was reminded of a quote most commonly attributed to Kevin

A. Plank, the founder of Under Armor; "trust is earned in drops but lost in buckets."

"Trust is something that has to be gained gradually, it has to be gained authentically," Carlisle explained. "It's gained through sweat-equity, being in the gym with players. It's gained building relationships, and so all those things are very, very important, and NBA players know authenticity. If you're not authentic and real with them, you're going to struggle to earn trust."

Trust is something Carlisle earned plenty of throughout his career. From the moment Fitch asked him to go from player to coach, to the way he led his 2010 Dallas Mavericks team to an NBA title, and in the way coaches around

the league voted him as President of the NBA Coaches Association in 2006. In his role with the NBCA, Carlisle sees the impact he has on both present and future coaches by working to negotiate things like coaches' pensions and broadcast access during the season.

"We work with the league on things that impact our present coaches a great deal, things involving content, access, signed appeals, rule changes, it's very wide-ranging, and it's very relationship-centric," Carlisle, now in his 16th season as President of the NBCA. "It's very much related to how strong our relationships are with whoever we're working with, whether it's the league, the referees, fellow coaches, or past coaches."


Carlisle is entering his 22nd year as a head coach, his second stint with the Indiana Pacers, a team he led from 2003-2007 to a 181-147 overall record, and offers this advice to players interested in making their transition within the game.

"Transitioning from playing to the next phase of your life is one of the great challenges as a player," Carlisle empathizes. "Coaching in the NBA takes your experience as a player and puts it to work. So, if you play in the NBA and have an interest in coaching, it's a great step and a great transition to stay in the game that you love."

"If you are a player in the NBA and interested in coaching, you should study the game, you should build relationships with coaches, and you should let people in front offices know that you're interested in coaching. If you do those things and prepare, there's a good chance that your preparation will be an opportunity at some point."

11TH ANNUAL JERRY COLANGELO HALL OF FAME GOLF CLASSIC








WNBA COMMISSIONER'S CUP 2022
